THESE EASY-TO-FOLLOW TIPS ON THE CARE OF YOUR GAS RANGE WILL MAKE IT LAST LONGER.

- 1.—Clean ports (small holes) of burners with wire or stiff brush. Wipe oil burners with damp cloth. If necessary, wash with warm water. Use washing soda only with old type star burners.
- 2.—Care should be taken to dry the burners thoroughly before putting them back on the range.
- 3.—Do not plug oven flue outlet. It causes inefficient oven operation.
- 4.—Don't bang oven doors or load them with heavy utensils.
- 5.—Wipe off spilled foods. Keep all parts clean. Wash janitor pan and grate after each use.
- 6.—If anything goes seriously wrong, call your dealer.

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
