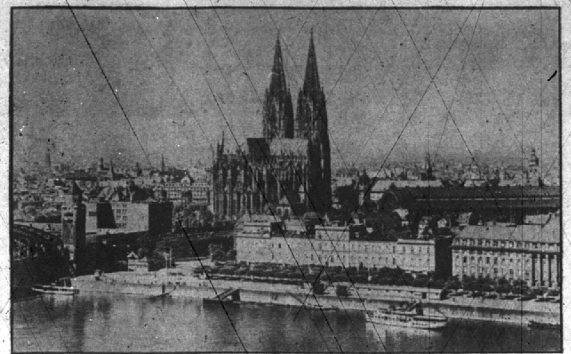
According to the chairman, new students and new sponsors are especially urged to attend.

The Council approved payment of the membership fee in the Birmingham Congress of Parents and Teachers which meets in Detroit in October.

Tentative plans for the year's program were reviewed by Mrs. W. A. Murray, 388 Tilbury, program chairman.

Wayne University To Offer Labor Lecture Course To Engineers

A new course of immediate interest to engineers and contractors will be offered at the Wayne University College of Engineering this fall, according to Dudley Newton, professor of civil engineering at the university.

Entitled "Labor Relations in Engineering Contracting," the new course will consist of a series of lectures dealing with labor problems of the contracting industry, the requirements of the Wagner Act and the privileges accorded labor under the act, and labor unions and their activities in the construction field. Recent cases and decisions will be cited and discussed.

The lecturer for the course will be Stephen D. Tutts, industry member of the Wage Adjustment Board for the Construction Industry, Washington, D. C. The class will meet from 7 to 8:30 p.m. in Room 2N01 of the main building, beginning Sept. 28.
