The 229 girls attending the Women's Girls' State of Michigan, American Legion Auxiliary Inc., elected Polly Hanson, of Birmingham, as their temporary secretary, who, with the temporary chairman, Mary Wilmont, of Royal Oak, had entire charge of the girls' state. Permanent officers were installed. The Girls' State held their fourth annual session at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, August 28 to Sept. 5.

These girls are chosen from schools all over Michigan for their outstanding qualities of leadership. Are 15 to 18 years old, and meet annually to spend a week learning of the vocations open to women, of the principles and practices of self government, and preparing to be better home-makers and community leaders. The Girls' State attend a program of education and recreation, directed by experienced educators and counselors, with the goal of developing leadership; and activities ranging from square dancing and competitive volleyball and soft ball to lectures, elections, and the publication of their own daily paper during the session, called the "Mercury-Go-Round."

The League will endeavor to assemble all possible information concerning candidates, voting and registration, Wayne County Home Rule Amendment, and will make this information available to the public.

Mrs. Peter Loomis will be chairman of the voting information committee, which will collect and have available to all voters facts concerning citizenship requirements, including naturalization and citizenship of married women, registration, past election statistics, provisions for soldier balloting in Michigan, general election information, including voting booths and machines, precincts, and the general provisions of the Wayne County Home Rule Amendment. Mrs. Loomis' committee will consist of Mrs. Berrien Ketchum, Mrs. John May, Mrs. Walter G. Patton, Mrs. Harlan Rowe, Mrs. Douglas Giles, Mrs. Charles Blunt, Mrs. William Williams, Mrs. Maxine B. Wendell, and Mrs. B. Readman.

The speakers bureau, which is to find and prepare speakers who will

give three to five minute talks to organizations is headed by Mrs. Adele Cook.

Information booths will be set up in strategic spots throughout the city with all election material. Mrs. Alan Loofbourrow will be in charge.

Mrs. John K. Ormond will endeavor to compile information of a factual nature on candidates for factually making offices. Mrs. Ormond will be assisted by Mrs. Paul Penfield, Mrs. Lawrence Van Cam and Mrs. Graham Shinnick.

Detroit Town Hall Plans Interesting '44-'45 Season

Two nationally known specialists in science, music and a noted Chinese aviatrix have joined celebrities appearing at Detroit Town Hall in the Fisher Theatre this season.

The series, featuring 20 Wednesday night recitals, music and entertainment, opens Oct. 11 with Donald Dickson, opera, radio, and stage star. Next, Guthrie McClintic, distinguished producer-husband of Katherine Cornell, will speak Oct. 18 on the "Theatre."

Oct. 25 David Dietz, science editor of Scripps Howard newspapers, discusses "Science and the Future," a subject embracing advances in medicine, surgical care and psychiatric discoveries, and postwar mechanical marvels for the home.

With the largest and easily the most outstanding galaxy of soloists ever scheduled to appear here, the Detroit Symphony Orchestra approaches the opening of its 1944-45 season confident that it is offering music lovers two unforfeitable series of concerts. Under the baton of Karl Krueger, and with Valter Ponds as assistant conductor, the 110-piece orchestra will be heard in 40 concerts—20 on Thursday nights and 20 on Saturday nights.

Headed at either Thursday or Saturday night concerts, none of which are repeat performances, will be such widely different guest artists as Fritz Kreisler, Jascha Heifetz, Margorie Lawrence, Rudolf Serkin, Jeanette MacDonald, Larry Adler, Claudio Arrau, Josef Hoffman and Haruo's Baker Theater.
