### Air Medal Awarded Lt. Chas. VanDusen

15TH AAF, Italy—2nd Lt. Charles T. Van Dusen, 21, pilot of an Italy based 15th AAF B-17 Flying Fortress, has been awarded the Air Medal for "meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight." He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Theron Van Dusen, of 783 Puritan Rd., Birmingham, Mich.

Lt. Van Dusen was graduated from the Cranbrook School, Bloomfield Hills, Mich., in 1944. He attended Purdue University, majoring in mechanical engineering, and is a member of Sigma Chi fraternity. Van Dusen was commissioned as a second lieutenant and won his pilot's wings upon graduation from advanced flying school at George Field, Ill., on March 12, 1944.

The Michigan Flying Fortress pilot flew his first combat bombing mission on Dec. 19, 1944, against Nazi railroad yards at Vienna, Austria. Lt. Van Dusen has flown 25 missions over enemy railroad yards, oil refineries and bridges in Germany, Austria, Northern Italy, Hungary and Czechoslovakia.

His wife, Mrs. Jane Van Dusen, and small daughter, Jane Elizabeth, reside at 19445 Shrewsbury drive, Detroit, Mich.
