Garden Club Hears Talk On Wildflower Conservation

Last Monday's meeting of the Birmingham Branch of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association was considered an inspiration to all garden lovers. The arrangements on the four tables depicting the four seasons of the year made an interesting background for the technicolor film "Four Seasons in the Gardens" shown by Charles Wilson, of Detroit.

Mrs. F. H. McKinney talked on the conservation of wildflowers. She told the members that anyone who is interested in wildflowers is eligible for membership in the Michigan Wildflower Association. Mrs. Marjorie T. Bingham, of the Cranbrook Institute of Science is president. The aim of the organization is to preserve native plants both by education and by law. Native species are disappearing fast. "A walk along the River Rouge is evidence of the fact," she said. "Here should be banks of ferns and violets, spring beauty, hepatica, bloodroot, true anemones, columbine and many others. But the ground is barren of most of these. They have disappeared because they have been picked too freely, pulled up by the roots or otherwise destroyed. This has been the history of the whole state resulting in barren areas, even sand plains in some places. Too late, we have learned that we only do harm by setting fire to grass and brush. In doing this we destroy not only the native plants but the humus which is so necessary to our very existence and has been accumulating for hundreds of years."

wild trees, shrubs, vines, or offer for sale the following: Trailing arbutus, bird's foot violet, climbing bitterweet, club mosses, flowering dogwood, all Michigan holly, North American Lotus, pupalwax, native orchids, trillium or gentian without the written consent of the owner of the property.

"The Michigan Department of Conservation has published their list of wildflowers that are rare and should not be picked: Adder tongue, arbutus, blood root, gentian, cardinal flower, columbine, flowering dogwood, ground pine, holly, Indian moss, Indian pipe, lady slippers, meadow lily, pitcher plant, trillium, American lotus and birdfoot violet."
