"Espionage of Resettling of Palestine" is the subject of a talk which will be given by Dr. David Schoonberger. Vocal solos will be presented by Victor Peck.

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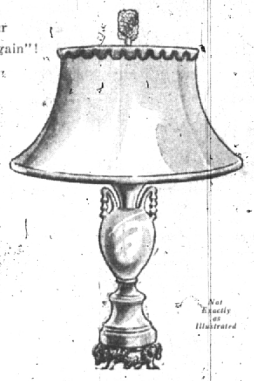


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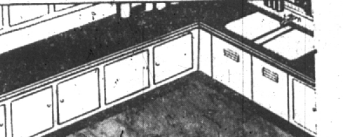

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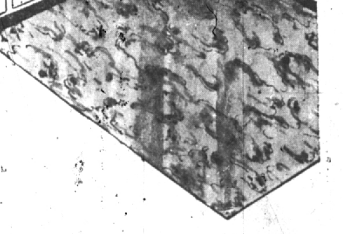
