"POINT-SAVER" MEAL

Here's a low-point and different recipe from our Home Service Department.

Liver Patties

- 2 lb. pork liver
- 1/2 cup chili sauce
- 2 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 2 tbsp. chopped parsley
- 2 tps. salt
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 egg
- 2 tps. chopped parsley

Fasten liver 10 minutes. Put through meat grinder, then mix well with all the other ingredients. Shape into patties three inches in diameter and about one inch thick. Wrap with a strip of bacon, and broil about five minutes on each side. Do not have patties too near broiler unit, as liver burns easily. Makes 10 patties.

WINS HIGH HONORS

A NINTH AIR FORCE FIGHTER BOMBER BASE, France

Second Lieutenant Robert E. Waggoner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Waggoner, 639 Hendley drive, Birmingham, Mich., P-47 Thunderbolt fighter-bomber pilot in the "Thunder Bomb" fighter squadron, attacked with his Ninth Air Force fighter group and aided in their being awarded Distinguished Unit Battle Honors. Lieut. Waggoner, as of late, has been making dive bombing, strafing, and rocket attacks against German naval columns, bridges, and enemy strong points.

HE BOMBS BERLIN

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England

Three Army aviators from the Detroit area made battle history recently when they flew in B-17 Flying Fortresses with the largest Eighth Air Force fleet of bombers ever sent against targets at Berlin. Members of the veteran 390th bombardment group, the men who braved vicious flak and fighter opposition to help hammer key links in the Berlin rail system, included Sergeant William F. Newton, 21-year-old engineer-gunner and son of Mrs. W.W. Newton of Bloomfield Hills.

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England

Promotion of Charles W. Sullivan, Jr., 22, of Farmington, from sergeant to staff sergeant, has been announced at this Eighth Air Force B-17 Flying Fortress station. Sgt. Sullivan is radio operator and gunner on Fortresses that is taking part in the bombing attacks against Nazi war industries and military targets in general in the European ground forces. He is the son of Charles W. Sullivan of Farmington, and was recently graduated from Farmington High School when he entered the AAF in November, 1942.

Mrs. David H. MacAdam, Jr., who is making her home with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J.
