## Gladiola Show To Be Held This Weekend

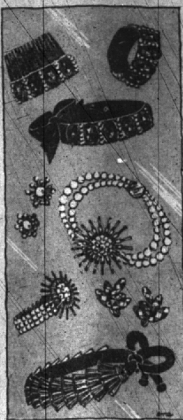
