Ordnance Number 221

The City of Birmingham Ordinance Number 221, known as the following respects: 1065 of Article 10 of Ordinance Number 221 be amended to read as follows:

Section 1002. Buildings erected in this city shall not be less than 10 feet in depth, provided, however, that where the depth of the lot is less than 10 feet, one half of the width of the lot shall be allowed, provided that the depth of the lot is not less than 5 feet.

Section 1105 of Article 11 of Ordinance Number 221 be amended to read as follows: 1105. Buildings erected in this district shall be provided with a year away from the street and shall be at least 10 feet in depth, extending further than 200 ft. in depth, either one of the streets that are adjacent to the lot, shall be considered as an alley of the lot.

For home drying in small quantities, baking pans may be placed in a slightly heated oven with the doors open, or old window screens covered with cheese cloth may be used for trays. Only the freshest, tenderest produce should be dried and all vegetables must be steamed or precooked for a short time. Steaming retains more vitamins and minerals and results in a better product.
