the 1946 campaign. Announcement of his decision to seek the Republican nomination following the declaration by Governor Harry Kelly that he would not run again for lieutenant-governor in 1946 and Lieut. Gov. Verplan Brown's statement he would run for governor in 1946.

Senator Higgins was first named to the house of representatives in 1938, beginning his term in 1939. He served again in 1941 and in 1943 and last fall was elected to the state senate. He has been active in the legislature, introducing about 80 bills which have been enacted into state law.

Among the prominent legislation which he introduced has been the bill to amend the method of collecting sales tax on automobiles; the homestead exemption for disabled veterans of World War I and the amendment in 1941 to include veterans of World War II; amendment to the racing bill to give the state increased revenue; liberalization of the workmen's compensation law; the sales tax on liquor; intangibles tax law revision; and another revision of the homestead tax exemptions to reimburse municipalities for the taxes lost through these exemptions.

Higgins procured passage of a bill to enable the municipalities in the southern part of the county to join in a hospital project. He sponsored the bill to place the coroner's duties under the county health department. He lent his support to representatives on legislation in which they were interested when it reached the senate. He aided in the completion of the water level bill which is one of special importance to this county.

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**Profit Residence Areas**  
Commissioner Main, but declared he arrived at his conclusions by a different method. "We should not desert those sections now nearly sold residential," he said. "But on Hunter I cannot conceive the average person wanting to sleep in a room along that street. We should zone back a hundred feet or so along Hunter for business and I would suggest a higher zoning for what is known as contractor row with a time limit for new businesses there. I feel property owners should be encouraged to develop their property into higher classifications."

**Buffer Area Needed**  
Commissioner Main said he felt that while some business areas should be allowed in the south end of the section, there should be a buffer set up of some type residential property. "I don't think stretches of single residence property should be continued along Hunter street," he said. "Business, Hunter area and I cannot see how we could do anything ward changing this area. I suggest we continue the high classification in the northern part of the section being considered."

"I am quite in accord with most of the suggestions already made," said Commissioner Palmer. "I think there should be a buffer area between the contractor row and the residential area. I don't think we should lead off from contractor's row. We probably will have to keep the contractor's row but should do something as much improvement as is possible. I feel that if we put in the suggested service street long Hunter we should set the business area back 150 feet or more. We should also change the little city park in the south part of the area."

**Problem A Tough One**  
Commissioner Malleider explained in greater detail the proposed service street along the east side of Hunter from Adams to the Smith-Poppleton park district and said that this proposal has some bearing on the zoning picture. "It would be difficult to put stores along Hunter at present," he said. "With the service street idea in mind it is up to us to fit the property owner's plans into the zoning picture as well as possible. If we can solve this present problem then we can surely solve most any problem facing us in the future."

"I agree with Commissioner Malleider and other commissioners that this problem is one of the toughest the commission has had in many months," said Mayor Moody. "The difficulty seems to center largely in that area known as contractor's row. It has been up for study for a year or so and then we referred it to the planning commission. I don't think we can say to the contractors that they must move but I feel we can improve the character of the area. From the questions and written objections during this and the previous meeting it is very evident not all of the people approve of the change as recommended by the zoning board. It looks to me as though we must reach a compromise. And when we do we should try to satisfy the people just as nearly as possible."
