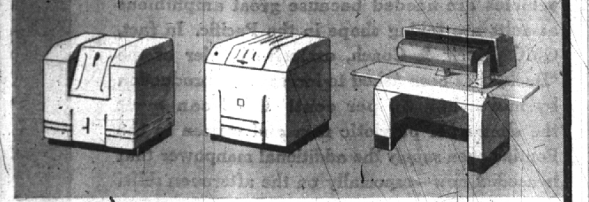
Robert Lynd, the director, states that the camp has a wonderful group of boys who are happy and enjoying the out-of-door life.
