All members, former members and anyone interested are welcome to attend. Members will please bring their own box lunches. A beverage will be served by the hostesses.

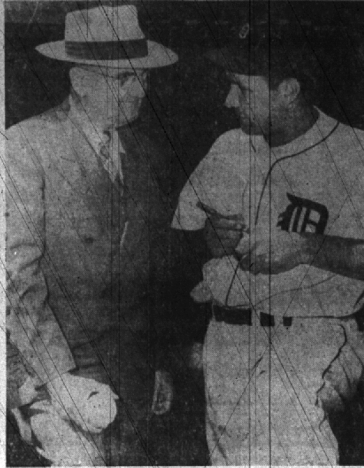
