

Training Courses For War Veterans Planned At M. S. C.

Three special training courses for agricultural enterprises, believed to be of particular interest to war veterans, will be inaugurated at Michigan State College this fall, Ralph W. Tenny, director of short courses, announced.

A cooperative project of the college and certain agricultural industries, one-year course, will give in forest practices and farm equipment service and sales and a two-year course in nursery and landscape management. In addition to on-campus instruction, the course will offer on-the-job training in industry.

To be eligible for the courses, one of the following requirements must be met: satisfactory completion of three years of high school, honorable discharge from the armed services, or satisfactory work experience and at least 19

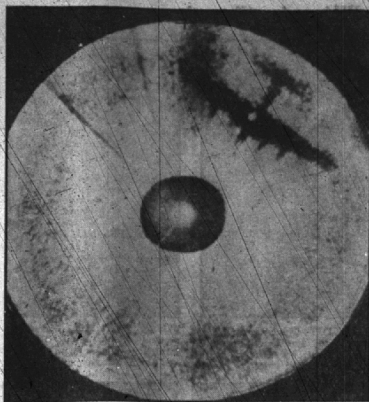
years of age. An applicant for the forestry course must be able to pass a physical examination to indicate that he is physically able to handle the work.

The courses will be operated on a 12-weeks basis coinciding with college quarters. Registration dates for the fall term are September 20-21. Requests for further information regarding the courses should be addressed to the short course director.

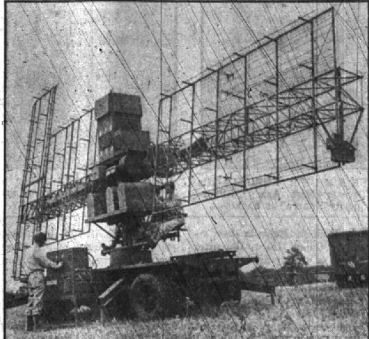
VETERANS AT M. S. C.

Between 400 and 500 war veterans are expected to be among some 4,500 civilian students enrolled when fall quarter classes at Michigan State College begin on Sept. 24. A 25 per cent increase over last fall is anticipated in civilian enrollment, including approximately 3,000 women students, the largest enrollment of girls ever recorded at M. S. C. In addition, 325 youths are receiving instruction on the campus under the Army Specialized Training Program.

Radar—It Sees Beyond Eyevew



This rare picture is from recently released Air Force photos showing how radar works. It shows an AAF bomber in such close range of the radar beam that the engine nacelles are clearly visible. This is a sample of what the radar operator sees on his screen. The Normandy beach was plotted by radar on D-Day. Other radar uses include locating enemy ships at sea, locating distant aircraft.



This is a mobile radar unit. Man at left is operating the keyer and modulator. Three men on seats behind triple-antennae are operating vertical position scope (short for oscilloscope), horizontal position scope, and range scope. These three cathode ray oscilloscopes plot the echo resulting when the beams meet a plane or other solid mass.

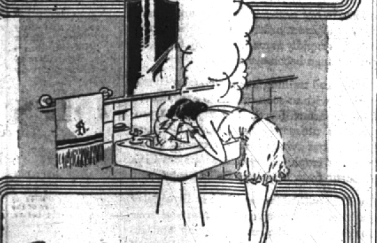

Refresher Course For Veterans Returning to University This Fall

ANN ARBOR—A four week pre-school refresher course for veterans whose study habits may have become a bit rusty while in the service, will be offered by the University of Michigan this fall, the Veterans Service Bureau has announced.

The course, which begins Sept. 24, will offer basic brush-up work in math, English and academic orientation for the fall term beginning Nov. 1.

Emphasis will be put on instruction in how to study, how to concentrate and prepare for exams, how to read rapidly and efficiently, how to budget study time and how to use library aids.

In addition, able veterans will be given an opportunity to "audit" or sit in on classes already in session.

According to the Veterans' Service Bureau, the course is primarily designed to combat the high academic mortality rate of returning veterans. Last fall and spring 70 out of 500 veterans dropped out of the U. of M. because of scholastic difficulties.

In a recent questionnaire, 41 per cent of the veterans now in attendance here indicated that they would have taken the refresher course had it been available. A majority of them reported having difficulty with math, foreign languages, science and English composition.

All fee costs for the refresher course will be absorbed by the Veterans Administration and enrolled students will receive full subsistence allowances. No academic credit will be awarded for the work.
