For Contributions
To March of Dimes

Topping last year's unprecedented donations by more than 50 per cent, the American people contributed \$16,529,374 to the 1945 March of Dimes of The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, as against \$10,975,491 for 1944. It was announced today by Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation from its national headquarters at 120 Broadway, New York City.

Of this sum Birmingham and Blount Hills contributed more than \$5,000, according to Herbert H. Gardner, of the local committee. Mr. Gardner and Michigan contributed \$673,515.85 during the campaign of last spring.

Of the total amount of funds raised, 50 per cent is allocated to national headquarters of the National Foundation to finance research into the cure and prevention of infantile paralysis and a broad educational program which includes scholarships and fellowships in orthopedic nursing, physical therapy, orthopedic surgery, virology and health education, as well as to maintain an emergency epidemic fund to aid County Chapters in areas hard hit by outbreaks of the disease.

The other half of the March of Dimes funds is retained by county chapters of the National Foundation to carry on year-round service to infantile paralysis victims in the 3,070 counties of the United States. Training the thousands of volunteer workers who staff the county chapters, Mr. O'Connor pointed out, that task alone in emergency epidemic aid, but in providing for the continuing care of those needing it, the National Foundation's chapters carry on the pledge of all possible aid to infantile paralysis victims regardless of age, race, creed or color.

In addition to maintaining his Birmingham residence, Mr. Walls for many years has had a summer home at Upper Straits Lakes. His son, Frederick J. Walls, Jr., now serving with the Navy, was a former metallurgist with Wilson Foundry Co., Pontiac.

Others participating were Ward Bathey, Maurice Lowman, Fred Ford and Al Nelson.
