The tomato worm is green in color and about three inches in length. The size of the worm enables them to defoliate several tomato stalks a day. Hand picking is the best method of controlling the worm, and arsenate of lead is also effective; however, arsenate of lead is a poison.

Sugar Stamp No. 38 Becomes Valid Sept. 1

The current ration of two pounds of sugar every four months will be continued for the remainder of the year.

OPA, announcing this formally, said sugar stamp No. 38 in Ration Book 4, good for five pounds, will be valid Sept. 1 and remain good through Dec. 31. The current stamp, No. 36, will not be good after Aug. 31.

Stamp No. 37 is not being valuated, OPA said, because many persons by mistake last year mailed No. 37 to local boards to obtain special ration allowances.
