This Is About Last Week For Planting Fall Victory Garden

Last call for planting for the 1945 Victory Garden campaign which can be sowed now and yet yield a harvest this fall, says John Gatlin, garden committee chairman.

Chinese cabbage (celery cabbage) may be sowed to both deep in drills two to three feet apart, and the plants thinned to 12 inches apart. This is an easy green crop for late fall use. Its main requirement is plenty of room to grow and to be kept free of cabbage worms by the use of rotenone. It heads naturally and needs no tying up. Like other cabbage-family crops, Chinese cabbage will stand some frost and grow best in cool weather. Seed not in August 1st will yield mature heads early in the October.

Sugar Or No Sugar, Can Those Peaches, Is Michigan Plea

Birmingham has been almost without sugar for some time. Once in a while some stores get sugar, but it just doesn't last long enough for every woman to get her supply.

With this in view the following suggestion of canning peaches with less sugar or with no sugar at all is a course of interest.

Michigan is going to have a big peach crop and women are being urged to "can" their peaches.

Miss Roberta Heryn, nutrition specialist at Michigan State college, head that fruit can be canned with little or no sugar, if necessary. No facility need be without plenty of home-canned peaches this year, she says.

It's a good plan to save part of the sugar supply for use in other ways, but make it go farther by adding some sirup or honey. But if no sugar is available, can them until soft. Pack the hot peaches loosely in jars and cover with boiling liquid to within one-half inch of the top. The lids may be adjusted according to the directions of the manufacturers and the jars processed in boiling water for 20 minutes. The boiling water should be at least two inches over the tops of the jars.

If no sugar is available, cook sliced or halved peaches in their own juice or with just enough hot water to keep them from sticking to the pan. Pack them in jars and cover with boiling liquid, and process if sirup were used.
