More Plans Made For Visit Here Of Dr. Frank Slutz

Mrs. Cleveland Walcott has announced plans for the 44-member organization's president and delegates luncheon, to introduce Dr. Frank Slutz to Birmingham on Wednesday, Jan. 16, at the Community House at 1230 Locust noon. The public institute dinner will be held at 6 o'clock at which Dr. Slutz will deliver the principal address, "All the World's a School."

At the luncheon four local speakers will sum up for Dr. Slutz, in five minute talks before he addresses the group, the present Birmingham organizations. Charles Smith will speak for men's and women's service clubs; Mrs. Peter Leons for Parent-Teacher groups and for the League of Women Voters; Mrs. E. Kestham will discuss the work of the women's church groups; Mrs. Wm. Milligan will speak for the women's social clubs. According to Mrs. Walcott and Mrs. John E. Ormond, in charge of the luncheon, tickets will cost 35 cents and member organizations will be called about reservations early in January.

This introduction to Birmingham will afford Dr. Slutz a basis of study of Birmingham in adult education and his counsel for the community. Mrs. Hugh D. McLeese, chairman, Mrs. F. H. Mellinger and Robert Warner, attendance committee, announce that reservations for the institute dinner must be made by calling the Community House before Saturday noon, Jan. 13. Since dinner reservations are limited, the committee says it will be necessary to limit each organization to five tickets with the hope that adjustments can be made later for those wanting more tickets. The price of the dinner will be \$15.00. Those who miss out on a dinner reservation are invited to be on hand at 7:05 o'clock to hear Dr. Slutz' address and for the panel discussion at 8 o'clock on "Who is an Educated Person?"
