### SOLDIER PIANIST COMING

In Music Hall Dec. 27 and 28 Walter Poole, assistant conductor of the Detroit Symphony, will conduct his own orchestra with Sgt. Eugene List as piano soloist in an all-Tchaikovsky program. The two Music Hall concerts are special appearances granted by Army officials and his fee are to be turned over

to the Army Emergency Relief Fund. These dates will mark the first concert to be given by the Detroit Symphony in their new home.
