"As Mayor of Birmingham, I extend on behalf of the entire community to you, Mr. Barnes, and to all who served in the armed forces, our gratitude for your services to your country in a time of great national peril. As I stated on V-J Day we citizens have a definite responsibility in re-establishing the returned veterans in their rightful place in the community. We are proud of us, as good American citizens, meet the challenge to help make the world happy and at peace forever."

NOTICE OF AMENDMENT
To City of Bloomfield Hills Zoning Ordinance

Public hearing will be held Tuesday, December 11, 1945 at 8:00 o'clock P. M. at the City Hall of the City of Bloomfield Hills, upon a proposed amendment to Section IV Sub-Section 3 or Ordinance No. 49, pertaining to the size of dwellings, to amend said Sub-Section to read as follows:

"IV. 3—Size of Dwelling—No private dwelling, excepting herefrom those classified as accessory uses, shall be erected or altered in District A, which contains by volume less than 35,000 cubic feet. The cubical content of a building shall be computed from the exterior face of the walls and from the bottom of the basement floor, or, in the case of basementless buildings, from the bottom of the foundation but not lower than 3 feet 6 inches below grade, to the average height of the roof, including all permanently enclosed and heated projections, bays, dormers and porches, but excluding unenclosed or semi-permanently enclosed porches, balconies, or projections of chimneys. The cubical content of attached garages shall not be included in the total required volume of private dwellings, except that the cubical content of any living quarters in connection therewith and having direct access to such dwelling shall be included.
