"We do not wish to refuse any of the requests which Birmingham is making for information on Dumbarton Oaks," said Mrs. Howard Liverance, in opening the drive which the League of Women Voters is making for \$500. The campaign will extend from February 1 to February 15. "The League has been more than willing to work, to obtain, print and distribute information, and until now all the literature has been paid by the dues of the members. However, the dues will no longer take care of the demand; and we are asking Birmingham to share the expenses of this educational campaign."

"The panels which the League has provided for discussion of a world organization have brought requests from many groups for further discussion, and we are most anxious to supply them." Other services which the League hopes to continue and expand are election activities, such as information, booths and candidate questionnaires, which met with great success last fall, and monthly reports on state and national legislation.
