Birmingham Women Organize to Boost Newest Campaign For Collection of Clothing for Russian Relief, Feb. 4 to 11

Birmingham women have accepted as a challenge the stories which come out of Russia concerning the suffering and deaths of the women and children—denials, not of just everyday needs as America knows them, but the things which go to sustain life itself.
A committee has been set up to begin a drive Sunday for collecting new or used clothing which is wearable. All articles will be acceptable which may be in protection of human bodies from the merciless cold of Russia and to aid its victims who are on the verge of starvation and death.
Nearly 40 million civilians have been removed from the path of the Russian Nazi invasion. The need for clothing for these and for the people in the evacuated areas in and around Moscow, Leningrad, etc., is beyond our conception. Approximately 85 million men, women and children face uncertainty as to how they may continue to live through the remaining winter.
Birmingham women are meeting these facts as a challenge, and meeting them without thought of creed or prejudice or political influence. They are meeting it only as fellowman to fellowman within the bond of sympathy which disaster is sure to bring.
The drive is on Sunday with collection places at the Community House and fire station. The churches are making collections. All clothing collected in Birmingham is expected to reach Russia within 28 days, mostly on Russian ships. Christ Church Cranbrook will serve as the Cranbrook collection center.
So, dear lady-of-the-house, you may start with your workbox and shoes, needles, thread and buttons as these articles are "out" for the duration. Soap is scarce and much needed. Look to your worn blankets, remembering that all such blankets, though worn, may be revamped and used to tuck some trusty little lad or lass in their bed. Meats—Fats—Red stamps Q5, R5, SS, good until March 31; red stamps T5, U5, V5, W5, and X5 good until April 28; Red stamps Y5, Z5, and A2, B2, C2, D2, good until June 2.
Processed Foods—Blue stamps X5, Y5, Z5, and A2 and B2 good until March 31; blue stamps C2, D2, E2, F2, and G2, good until April 28; blue stamps H2, J2, K2, L2, and M2, good until June 2.
Sugar—Stamp 34 good until Feb. 28; stamp 35 good until June 2.
Fuel—Oil—East, periods 4 become good Feb. 5, 1945; mid-west, periods 4 and 5 become good Feb. 5, 1945; far west, period 4 becomes good Feb. 5, 1945; south, periods 4 and 5 become good January 29.
Shoes—Airplane stamps 1, 2, and 3 in book three, good indefinitely.
