A.A.U.W. Holds No Travel Convention Tuesday, May 29th

At a meeting of the Birmingham Branch of the American Association of University Women held February 14 it was announced by Mrs. Harry N. Graber, president, that a national convention without travel will be carried out by the association to conduct its biennial business and still comply with the governmental ban on non-essential assemblies which would tax transportation and hotel facilities.

An election of officers will be held and action taken on the legislative measures. Every branch will meet in convention session on the same day, May 29, for an inspirational program with workshop sessions and convention addresses. Branch delegates will be appointed in the usual manner for A.A.U.W. conventions. They will cast their votes by mail.

The non-travel convention will center its discussion and decisions on problems related to the war and the peace. Theme of the coast to coast meeting will be: "The University Women's Responsibility in Time of Crisis."
