Braised Liver with Vegetables
 1 pound liver
 1 1/2 lbs. fat
 1 cup stock
 1 cup tomato juice
 1 1/2 lbs. flour
 1 1/2 cup oil
 1 cup butter

Scald liver, cut into two-inch squares, in flour salt and pepper, and brown in fat or high heat. Remove from fat, add vegetables and brown lightly. Combine liver, vegetables and seasonings in skillet cover and simmer for one hour. If desired, liquid may be thickened to make a gravy.

Competition For Honor Awards At Cranbrook Opens

The tenth annual competition for scholarship at Cranbrook School, Bloomfield Hills, has been announced by W. Brooke Stabler, headmaster. The awards are available to boys who will be ready to enter the 7th to 11th grades, inclusive, in September of this year. Boys wishing to enter the competition must send a letter to the registrar of the school requesting that his name be enrolled on the list of candidates. This letter must be accompanied by a letter of recommendation from the boy's present school principal and must reach Cranbrook School not later than Friday, April 6.
 Boys who are accepted as candidates will then be required to take prescribed examinations at Cranbrook school or under the supervision of a local teacher recommended by the principal. Examinations at Cranbrook will be held on Saturday, April 14, according to Mr. Stabler.

In addition to the results of the tests, the following factors will be taken into consideration in granting the Honor Awards:
 1—previous school record; 2—character and leadership; 3—special cultural abilities; 4—health and athletic ability; 5—need of financial assistance.
