After thirty-five hours of class instruction and forty-five hours of supervised practice in the hospital, the Nurses Aides will be assigned special days for duty. Nurses Aides are off-setting the shortage of nurses in civilian hospitals by assuming duties which release registered nurses for the more technical phases of their profession.
