Hear Dr. Fairbanks

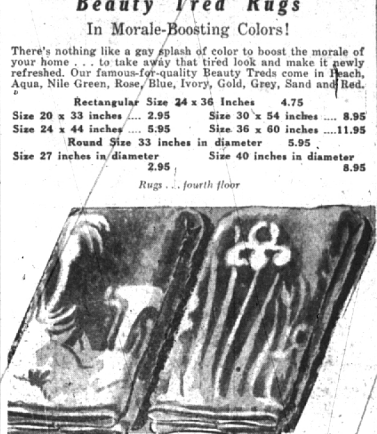

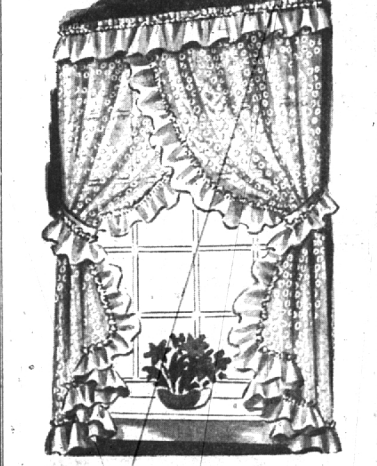
