**SURPRISE!** Here is another oven treat from our Home Service Department:

**Cranberry Surprise Muffins**  
2 cups flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 tbsps. sugar  
2 tbsps. melted butter  
3 tbsps. baking powder  
1 cup milk  
1 canberry sauce

Combine dry ingredients. Combine liquid ingredients and add to dry ingredients as quickly as possible, mixing only enough to dampen the flour. Place a spoonful of batter in each muffin tin. Place a cube of cranberry sauce in the center of each muffin, and cover with more batter. Bake 25 minutes in a 400° F. oven.



**TRUTH ABOUT "TAXLESS TOWNS."** Some people mistakenly believe that all a town needs to do to rid of taxes is to put in a municipal lighting plant and pay the cost of government out of plant profits. Actually, a private company—operating at a small profit—can usually furnish cheaper electricity than the city can make for itself! The private company serves a wide area and has the advantage of volume mass-production of power. It pays large taxes to the city—exceeding the "contributions" made to the city by a municipally owned plant. The fairy tale of "taxless towns" in many cases is inspired by people who have engine equipment and services to sell—and want to make a profit.

**Many From City Attend League Session Monday**  
Birmingham was well represented at the League of Women Voters' mid-winter conference at the Hotel Statler on Monday and many turned out for the banquet when Miss Anna Lord Strauss spoke on "Cooperating for Democracy."  
"The State Department is analyzing public opinion as never before," said Miss Strauss, "and depending on the people to express their will as to what kind of international organization they want, and how soon our participation in it should start." She emphasized the importance of its starting immediately, while the nations are of necessity cooperating in the reconstruction of the world.  
"The League's Washington headquarters keeps in close touch with the State Department, and they, in turn, constantly consult the League's opinion, because the close relationship between national, state and local Leagues gives the reaction of the smaller community a deciding factor in the question of public opinion."  
"Even though the Dumbarton Oaks Proposals are by no means perfect, they represent a necessary compromise, even as compromise was necessary in the drawing up of our constitution, and as then, the rights which we must give up will be given up not to some other state or country, but for the good of the nation."  
"The United States is not Santa Claus, but it is the richest and most powerful country in the world, and without us, no international organization can survive. Our share of the money, though greater than our share of any other nation, would equal the amount we spend in fighting the war for five days."  
**Other Highlights:**  
Some highlights from the afternoon conference:  
Mrs. Harold Scott, member of the National Child Labor Committee. "The progress of a state can be measured by the way it treats its children. Michigan laws, dating back to 1901, are entirely out-of-date with changed conditions."  
Professor James Pollock: "Institutional faults are responsible for the shocking conditions now being brought to light in Lansing. A complete change of governmental structure, such as the unicameral legislature would eliminate the opportunity of 'kick passing' between the two houses, and would be set up so as to eliminate the antagonism between executive and legislative."  
Miss Zeno Woodford, member of the Michigan State Bar Association: "We are paying the financial bill for discrimination against minorities."  
Mrs. Ralph L. Yonker, president of the Birmingham League of Women Voters, speaking on the subject of the publicizing of the Dumbarton Oaks Proposals, toward which the entire conference was aimed: "We are fortunate in Birmingham in having a Community Council, whose purpose is to eliminate overlapping activities by local organizations. Through the Council it was immediately made plain that all are united in the will to bring the U. S. States into such an international organization to promote world peace and prevent future wars."

**Naval Commander to Preach Here Sunday**  
Lieut. Commander C. Leslie Glenn, USN, will be the guest preacher at Christ Church Cranbrook this coming Sunday, Jan. 21, at 11 a. m. Lieut. Commander Glenn was for two years the chaplain of the USS Prairie State Shipman's School, New York City. Among his many duties he preached each Sunday afternoon in the Riverside Church to three thousand midshipmen. For the past eight months he has been on active sea duty as one of the large battleships of the Navy.  
Prior to Chaplain Glenn's entering the Navy, he was for nine years the chaplain at Harvard University in Cambridge, Mass. In September, 1941 he was granted leave of absence as rector of St. John's Church, Washington, D. C. to assume his present post.
