Factories

One of the favorite solutions of the problems of On Farms. American farmers is the suggestion that factories and farme be near together, so that industry can use the products of agriculture.

While it is apparent that a proper solution of the ills of agriculture constitutes one of the imperative tasks of the nation, there is little reason to believe that the farmers' wese can be abolished by locating factories.

In fact, the problem will be solved gradually, if at all. The advent of plastics and the use of farm products in manufacturing is promising, but such processes do not develop overnight. They rarely develop completely in a generation.

Our advice to farmers who face difficulties is that they make a resolute effort, as individuals, to improve their lot, taking advantage of conditions that exist. It will not do to wait for chemistry to present a pana-

After all, the judividual who succeeds in any line of work scores a success through his own efforts. There are exceptions to this statement, but they are scattered few and far between.
