League of Women Voters Will Hold Conference Jan. 15
 Many Birmingham women are expected to attend the midwinter conference of the National League of Women Voters which will be held in Detroit on January 15th and 16th.
 On Monday, the 15th, the meeting will be at the Hotel Statler, concluding with an informal banquet at 7 p.m. The banquet is open to the public, and all League members are being especially urged to attend, and bring guests. Reservations must be made by January 8th. Tickets are \$3.50 including tax and tips, and may be reserved by calling the League office at Birmingham 2269 or Mrs. R. L. Yonker at Birmingham 4688. Speakers at the banquet will include Miss Anna Lord Strauss, national president of the League.
 The conference is to be a rallying for the League foreign policy drive, and to map out the League's campaign in support of the Dumbarton Oaks proposal.
 Miss Strauss will meet with state executives at 10 a.m. From 1:30-3 p.m. there are to be discussions of Michigan state issues. Harold V. Scott will speak on child labor, Lewis Schimmel on taxes, Professor James Pellock on the unemployment act, which will be presented to the legislature this year, and to discuss by Miss Vaio Woodford, the lawyer who is writing the act.
 A model united nations panel will be held from 3:00-4:30 p.m. with open discussion from the floor. Mrs. Orville Bond will moderate, and Miss Strauss, Mrs. Walter Kull, Mrs. Ralph Yonker and Charles Spooner will be on the panel.
 The conference on Tuesday, the 16th, is to be held at the Backham Building, with a state board meeting at 10 a.m. and in the afternoon a conference with Miss Strauss and local league presidents.
