Town Hall Series Program Revealed

Detroit Town Hall—17th consecutive Season at The Cass Theatre—1945-1946.

The Detroit Town Hall at the Cass Theatre, for its 17th consecutive season, is continuing the policy of the shorter course of 14 Friday morning lectures. Twelve of the speakers are announced for the winter opening on Oct 19th and 20th and 21st.

Two of Town Hall's popular and beloved speakers are being returned: Lieut. John Mason Brown, now in inactive service from the U. S. Navy, will give his inimitable series of Broadway Plays, and Edward Weeks, editor of the Atlantic Monthly, one of America's finest lecturers on contemporary literature.

Others under contract are: Bartolini, the incomparable French actor and singer—"a superb one-man theatre" well known to European and Californian audiences; Emily Hahn, author of "The Young Sisters" and "China to Me," a contributor to The New Yorker; Volney Howard, staff correspondent and radio editor of The Christian Science Monitor, who for many months has been with the American forces on the battle fronts in Germany and France, with Eisenhower; and Andre Morize, author and Professor of French literature at Harvard University.

By unanimous request Dr. Hilston, a distinguished scientist and chemist, is being returned and others listed are: Bonaro Wilkinson, eminent eminent psychologist, noted for her work in adult education; Count Richard N. Coudenhove-Kalergi, Founder and President of the Pan-American Union; Dr. Roymond Walsh, widely known today through his National Radio broadcasts on economic planning; Robert Kazmayer, author, world traveler and commentator speaking on "The Challenge That Is America," who will only return in October from this summer in Europe; and Philip Cummings, news analyst and consultant to the U. S. Government, on "The Southwest Pacific."

Proposed New Classroom Building at M. S. C.

Above is the architect's drawing of Michigan State College's proposed new classroom building, work on which begins as soon as the college is granted a special order of materials. The building will have a seating capacity of 2,200 students and will contain 50 classrooms, washrooms, and an office for the building supervisor.

Designed to harmonize with the architecture of neighboring campus buildings, the steel-framed structure will occupy a site just north of the horticulture building. The interior will be of steel beams and plaster, and heat will be supplied from the central heating plant on the campus. Strictly a classroom building, without laboratories or offices, the structure will be used by classes from all M. S. C. schools.

Construction probably will require from eight months to a year, depending upon the labor situation. Cost will be approximately \$700,000.



Championships At Cranbrook July 23

Cranbrook School announced this week that it will be host to the Western Junior and Boys' tennis championships tournament this month, beginning on July 23 and continuing through July 28.

The Western Tournament is sponsored by the Western Lawn Tennis Association. The Junior division is for boys from 16 to 18 years of age, and the boys' division includes those 15 and under. All matches will be played on the courts at Cranbrook. There will be both single and double events in both divisions.

W. Boyce Ricketts, of Cranbrook, will manage the tournament, and correspondence may be written to him or Miss Louise Houser at Kingwood School. Miss Houser is acting as secretary of the tournament and she can be reached by telephone at Birmingham 1066W.

Entries are expected from coast to coast, with some having arrived from California and Florida, as well as Washington, D. C. The outstanding entry so far is that of Weston Delming of River Forest, Illinois, who ranks number 2 in the city of Chicago, fifth in the W. L. T. A., and eighteenth nationally. Three members of the crack Crook Pointe high school teams are also in the fold. They include Jim Barker, Jim Kennedy and Henry Kubiatan.

Boys' Tennis Finals Played Last Sunday

The finals of the Boys and Juniors division of the singles tennis tournament were completed Sunday afternoon at the H. S. School courts. In the Junior division Don McLeese triumphed over Tom Cookerly in a thrilling three-set match, 6-2, 6-8, 6-2, in the other semi-final match Bud Gregory defeated Don Begen 6-2, 6-8. In the boys' division Langdon Crane came from behind to win from Pete Hartman 6-6, 6-6 default. Dick Adams defeated Harris Jackson 6-0, 6-1.

A large crowd witnessed the finals to see Bud Gregory, last year's junior champion, repeat by downing Don McLeese, Northwestern University student, 6-2, 6-1. In the boys' division Dick Adams downed Langdon Crane 6-1, 6-1 to gain the boys' championship. The winner and runnerup of each division thus qualifies to play in the state tournament at Kalamazoo next week.

Then Bob Southland connected for a single and a run crossed the plate. It was enough to win the game, but two more Hazel Park scores were tallied in the third and two more in the seventh. Cramer was only able to solve Marty's delivery for three, two of them in the second after two were out.

LATHRUP BOYS WIN

The baseball team from the Lathrup Township playground defeated the Adams Intermediate team 16 to 9, in a game played Monday. It was played at Pierce Field. Alfred Cobb batted for the winners and Bob Poline for the losers. Bob Mitchell, Lathrup left fielder, turned in an outstanding performance at the plate with three for four. He walked in his fifth turn at bat and grounded out to the second baseman in his first fruitless effort.

Lathrup also battered the team from Barnum playground on Tuesday to the tune of 26 to 10. It was a loosely played contest in which each team made numerous errors and garnered several hits. These players are boys not over 12 years of age.
