Gruber, numbered such contributions to the community as the presentation of nationally known lecturers—Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr, Dr. Lillian M. Gilbreth, Miss Mary Swenney and Dr. W. Brooke Stabler; the production, "Peter Pan" and "The Indian Captive," first play given by the newly organized drama group; active participation in Dumbarton Oaks Week, and the Mid-America Institute, and a \$650 book sale which made possible many gifts. Among them was a check for \$225.50 to buy an tractor for use in Dr. Eitel Kibel's treatment of infantile paralysis patients; \$50 to the National Infantile Paralysis Fund; \$100 to the Community House; \$100 to the Save the Children Federation to support a school in France for a year; \$50 to the Red Cross; \$50 for a radio for the Deaconess Hospital; \$50 to decorate a day-room at Romulus air base; a victrola for soldiers from Selfridge Field going to a remote outpost; \$150 for the AAUW Fellowship for the Charles H. Loomis to talented women for research and study; and \$75 to the celebration of the 25th anniversary of the International Relations class.

Plans for the coming year were discussed at a meeting following the luncheon. Mrs. Saunders announced that AAUW will celebrate its twenty-fifth anniversary this year with appropriate recognition. This organization, together with the Garden Club, League of Women Voters and the Village Players will sponsor a community house lecture series. A new play for the Children's Theatre is under consideration.



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
