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Faith O. Baker Weds Sgt. John D. Lesia In Evening Ceremony

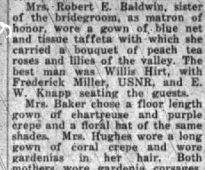

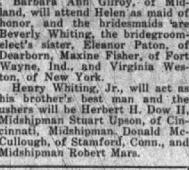
Helen Dow and Macauley Whiting Plan July Wedding
