Mrs. F. G. Garrison Tells Rotaryans Of Beauties Of Argentina At Luncheon At Home Of Mrs. Alfred La Belle

Mrs. F. G. Garrison, pictured Argentina as the most progressive country in South America. Monday afternoon in a delightful and informal talk before members of Birmingham Rotary Lays at the home of Mrs. Alfred J. LaBelle on Wing Lake road. "It is a marvelous when one stops to think of all that these people have accomplished in the past 25 years when their progress began," Mrs. Garrison said, adding that Argentina is vastly different from the northern countries of that continent.

In her description of the Buenos Aires social, business and economic set-up, she went on to state, "I consider Argentina more European than any other country of South America because that has always been and still is their dominating influence. There are no Indians as there are in the northern adjoining countries. Buenos Aires is one of the most cosmopolitan cities in the world; their educational opportunities for all classes in the cities are many; but not so in the rural districts."

They Enjoy Life
Mrs. Garrison, in her description of a luxurious standard of living for the more wealthy class, painted a gala ward picture of their huge bathrooms, modern and elegantly presented, and their servants ready to wait upon each and every guest. She described the people of Argentina as "intelligent people who earnestly wish to be good neighbors of North America, but certainly not dictated by them nor patronized. She pointed out the wisdom in seeking friendship of this country which is at present in such a state of unrest with different factions ready to exert their influence upon the people, especially in trade negotiations."

Mrs. Garrison commented upon different writers making brief stays in Argentina and writing upon their ways and customs from her own personal view points. She suggested "Argentine Diary," by R. Joseph, as a most authentic book. She stated that Argentina is ready for Democracy, and expressed the opinion that with a middle class becoming more and more powerful "that the time is becoming more ripe for such a government."

Report Broken Street Lights
