Oakland Red Cross Pleads For Women For Hospital Duty
 The American Red Cross has advised the Oakland County Chapter that the need for qualified women to serve in domestic military and naval hospitals is mounting steadily.
 With more than 8,000 sick and wounded servicemen being received daily in the hospitals of the nation, there is grave danger that the traditional welfare and recreation services of the Red Cross in military hospitals may have to be curtailed drastically unless there is an immediate response to this appeal.
 Approximately 6,000 Red Cross hospital workers are now assigned to both overseas and domestic military hospitals and the sick and wounded population of these military hospitals exceeds 500,000 servicemen.
 The American Red Cross needs women between the ages of 22 to 45 who have training and experience as case workers of recreation supervisors, and Cross social workers have the job of helping the servicemen with their personal and family problems. They worry over which may be retarding their recovery.
 All persons interested in further information about these openings are requested to report at once to the local Red Cross Chapter office at 400 S. 1st St., Pontiac. Anyone knowing persons who might be interested in this kind of employment is asked to furnish the Chapter with names and addresses.
