Marine Corps Opens Enlistments to Boys of 17-Year-Old Class

An unlimited quota of enlistments of 17-year-olds has been announced by the local recruiting office of the U. S. Marine Corps in Detroit.

Any boy who has passed his 17th birthday may enlist either for a four-year enlistment or for a two-year enlistment. He must have completed two years of high school, be five feet six inches tall, weigh 125 to 150 pounds and have 15-20 vision.

He must have the written consent of his parents or guardian and he may not be married or have dependents.

These enlistments affect only 17-year-olds. Anyone past his 18th birthday is subject to the usual induction procedure of Selective Service.
