### Birmingham Officer Aids Plane Attack On Japs From Okinawa

OKINAWA—An executive officer at the AAF Air Transport Command base closest to Tokyo, Maj. Winston T. Kellogg, of Birmingham, Mich., came in on the first A-26 plane to land here April 8 and has helped them then flying daily since then despite 150 separate bombs, strafing and shellings attacks on the airfield.

Once, a Jap strafing plane caught him in the open during a surprise attack, but he was escaped by pitching himself down an embankment.

Major Kellogg and others of the unit have used Jap-built retreatments and bomb shelters for protection against enemy air attacks.

Before coming to the Pacific last August, the major served two years in the 2d Ferrying Group at Romulus Army Air Field, Michigan, and he was base executive officer who oversaw overseas duty. His wife and three children live at 187 Hazelwood street, Birmingham.
