THE ECCENTRIC'S Camera Corner



Everyone finds interest in pictures like this one.

TIME and again in this column we have stressed the importance of making close-ups of people rather than long shots. Today we want to suggest how you can make your close-ups more interesting.

The chief reason for a close-up, of course, is to obtain a good likeness of your subject. But it isn't sufficient to confine photography just to good likenesses. For a series of such pictures, a number of people could be moonstruck even if the technique were perfect. But pictures of the same people in characteristic poses might well be more interesting even if the technique left something to be desired.

There are a number of factors which lend interest, all or only a few of which may be under the control of the photographer, depending on the circumstances. If the subject is being photographed around his or her home, some choice of clothing is presumably offered. If the day is of no consequence, the time is of no consequence, the time for the picture, to obtain proper lighting conditions, can be chosen. In residential or commercial settings, or in the country, suitable backgrounds are usually no problem. "Props" are avail-
