**DETROIT EDISON**

**STRETCHING OIL** . . . By means of a special process, using recently installed equipment, Detroit Edison now expects to salvage every year more than 150,000 gallons of used insulating oil. The oil reclaimed for further use in thousands of transformers and other electrical equipment is, after processing, equal in quality to new oil. Besides the fact that oil vital to the war is thus stretched to go farther, the new process effects an important economy, helping the company keep electric rates down in spite of ever-rising costs.

**FULL STEAM AHEAD** . . . Deep under downtown Detroit, five steam rushes through Edison steam mains at 600 miles per hour per hour, to heat a hundred million dollars worth of downtown buildings. Thirty to sixty feet underground, miles of tunnels containing Edison steam mains carry steam to buildings that have no furnaces or boilers, depending entirely on Detroit Edison steam heating service. Over 1,500 customers use more than 2 1/2 billion pounds of steam annually—requiring 192,000 tons of coal. Edison has four large heating plants to provide steam for this tremendous heating job. Saving electricity saves coal, transport and manpower.

**LENTE LUNCHEON** . . . Our Home Service Department suggests this meatless recipe for Lent:

*Baked Luncheon Sandwiches*

1 cup grated carrots	2 cups flour
1 cup cooked peas	3 tsp. baking powder
1/2 cup chopped celery	1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup medium white sauce	1/2 tsp. dry mustard
1 tsp. grated onion	1/4 tsp. shortening
Salt and pepper	1/4 cup milk

Combine carrots, peas and celery mix with white sauce. Add onion and veal with salt and pepper. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and mustard, cut in shortening. Gradually add milk, mixing to form a soft dough. Roll out dough 1/4-inch thick or lightly floura board; cut in three-inch squares. Spread vegetable mixture between each two squares. Place on baking sheet and bake in hot oven 425° F. about 20 minutes. Serve hot. (Serves six.)

**KITCHEN CRAFT** . . . To minimize chances of soggy pie crust, sprinkle the dough with sugar, or brush with white of egg, before adding the filling.

**RATIONING AT A GLANCE**

Meats and Fats—Ration book No. 4 red stamps Q5, R5 and S5, good through March 31; T5, U5, V5, W5 and X5, good through April 28; Y5, Z5, A2, B2, C2 and D2, valid through June 2.

Canned Goods, Jams, Jellies—Ration book No. 4 blue stamps X5, Y5, Z5, A2 and B2, valid through March 31; C2, D2, E2, F2 and G2, good through April 28; H2, J2, K2, L2 and M2, valid through June 2.

Sugar—Sugar stamps No. 34, good through Feb. 28; No. 35, valid through June 2.

Flour—Stamps Nos. 1, 2 and 3 on "cups" sheet in Book 3 good indefinitely. Certificates for purchase of men's rubber boots and rubber work shoes good indefinitely.

Gasoline—Stamp A11 good for four gallons through March 21; B3 and B5 and C6 and C9 coupons good for five gallons each.

Food Oil—Periods four and five coupons from the 1943-44 season good through the coming season. (See gallons per unit. All change-making coupons are now good. Period 1, 2 and 3 coupons for new heating season now good.
