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List of Curfew 'Don'ts' Is Issued By Office Of WMC in Michigan

Birmingham is reported falling well in line with national orders on the midnight curfew ruling. Thus far there have been no reports of any violations and various groups, both public and private, have been closing their events promptly at midnight. Additional instructions are received at various headquarters of the War Manpower Commission from time to time but where no special ruling is issued to the curfew is available to all citizens and is expected to be used with common sense," according to a directive issued by the state office of the WMC.

At the same time the WMC announces its decision on specific cases.

A wedding reception held in a hall must stop at midnight.

A fish fry held regularly by a group of about 50 afternoon workers at 11 p. m. in a hall and usually lasting until the beer gives out (say 3 a. m.) is out.

A night holding a dance after midnight is forbidden.

A school sorority dance in a hotel must stop at midnight.

No exemptions shall be made without clearance with state and regional offices of the WMC prior to March 15. At that time complete instructions from Washington are expected to be available.

The WMC said that its original estimate of 95 per cent compliance was, if anything, conservative.
