

### Exchange Studies Movie Censorship

Lieut. Chas. Snyder of the Detroit police department gave a highly interesting address to the members of the Exchange Club of Birmingham at their regular meeting at the Community House Tuesday.

The censorship of his department affects the entertainment of the entire state as no other municipality has such a department but depends on Lieut. Snyder for approval or rejection. Seventeen movies were refused permission to show in Michigan last year after

being rejected by the Detroit police department, he said.

**Visual Education**

An his talks he dealt chiefly with his experiences in the movie field. "Visual education is the most far-reaching education of today," he said. "The Army recognizes this fact and has cut the training time to a fraction of what was formerly required in the technical training of soldiers by the use of motion pictures."

"In everyday movies adults can take unto themselves that which is good and cast out that which is bad but not so with youth. And it is youth that we must protect from harmful influences due to improper movies."

He questioned the advisability of boys seeing too many war movies, claiming that movies make the trends. Boys, who years ago played cowboy and Indians, later played "cops and robbers" and are now playing "Japs and Marines," all traceable to different patterns of the movies through the years. "Sometimes harm comes to boys from making their games too realistic," he added, "as was cited in the case of a Detroit boy who was hanged by the wrists to a tree. When found he explained that he, being the smallest boy in the group, was picked to play the part of the Jan. Bird dropping off the boy's elbows from the wrist wounds, gave evidence that the man had ceased to be fun for that boy."
