U. S. Army's Special Training Course Is To Be Opened Again

With the reopening of the army specialized training reserve program, young men whose seventeenth birthday falls between Sept. 30, 1944, and Sept. 1, 1945, are eligible to take the qualifying test. Youths may secure applications from any high school principal and must return them to him by March 31, 1945, in order to be allowed to take the test.

The ASTRY is a college training program for 17 year old boys in anticipation of their active duty in the army and is given at a selected college or university. Applicants must achieve a satisfactory score on the test, which will be given in all high schools and colleges April 12. In addition an applicant must meet certain requirements of age, citizenship, high school graduation and must enlist in the military reserve or college reserve.

Details may be obtained from high school principals or college registrars.
