War Show Will Be Held At Cranbrook From May 12 to 27

At the request of the U. S. Treasury Department the first Oakland County War Show will be held at Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills, from May 12 to May 27, inclusive, according to an announcement received today from L. H. Green, Oakland county chairman of the 7th War Loan Drive. Helping support the Seventh War Loan War Show committee will ask Oakland county residents to submit souvenirs for approval to be placed in the Cranbrook Institute of Science or the Cranbrook pavilion. No articles will be accepted at this time. Interesting items which Oakland county men in service have sent home will be displayed together with other additional features, including war material which is manufactured in this area. Some outstanding paintings and photographs illustrating war activities may also be shown. The Treasury Department has also promised a war film from the battle fields which will be featured daily in the Cranbrook Institute of Science auditorium.
