## Prof. J. K. Pollock Speaks At Meeting Of Woman's Club

Professor James K. Pollock, Ph.D. of the University of Michigan, addressed a large group at the Baldwin Library Tuesday afternoon. Students of international relations from Baldwin High School and members of Mrs. Charles F. Shain's adult class were special guests of the Woman's Club.

Dr. Pollock spoke on "The Significance of the Christian Conference." He analyzed the provisions of the Christian Charter, pointing out the three great powers in the finished document. He cautioned his listeners to consider the great chaos and confusion of a devastated Europe. This conference was not only military but very political, he said. It took up the problems of government in the liberated countries and the questions of education. He reiterated the fact that now, for the first time in history, the United States pledged to participate in the settling of these great questions.

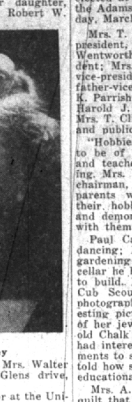
