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### Chick Rutan Picks His Golfing Staff

Chick Rutan, Birmingham Country Club professional, made the statement this week that his golf staff is now complete. James B. Sheffield, formerly of Bakewood, Calif., will serve the club as assistant pro and Ted Magdon of Detroit will fill the job of caddy master. Both men have had previous experience in other club jobs.

Sheffield has held similar positions in California country clubs, including the Lakewood club at Hollywood, where Bill Crosby and Bob Hope are members. He has worked for the Virginia Country Club in Long Beach, the Sunny-side-Mc Fresno, the city that he now calls home, and the La Camar club at Santa Barbara. He started as a caddy at the Stockdale Country Club in Bakewood and he still likes to take an occasional job. In fact, he made the winter golf tour as a professional caddy. Among the golfers he worked for was Jim McHenry, one of the leading money winners of the past season, and Ed Purzol of Fresno, who is his partner in the tour. Jim was in an automobile accident several years ago and incurred a leg injury that sustained it that time nipped a promising career as a player in the bud.

Magdon is a former star golfer on Highland Park High school, where he was a member of the varsity team. He was a member of the varsity team at the University of California at Berkeley and served as assistant pro at Bedford Golf Club before his induction into the Army in 1943.
