1 unbaked pie shell  
1 cup milk  
1 cup honey  
2 eggs  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 tsp. white Nutmeg

Beat eggs until light and foamy. Add honey, milk, salt and vanilla. Pour into unbaked pie shell and sprinkle with nutmeg. Bake for 30 minutes in a preheated, 425° F. oven.
