**Cranbrook School of Theater Will Offer Post-Graduate Work**

Cranbrook Summer Theatre School will offer for the first time this year a post-graduate course intended for those who plan to follow the theatre arts as a vocation or who intend to be dramatic teachers and directors in community theatres.

Entrance to the new course which will co-ordinate all phases of the theatre arts will be limited and only those who qualify after personal interview will be accepted, according to Carl G. Wonnberger, under whose personal direction the work will be given.

Other courses to be offered in the Theatre School will be a course for high school students, a course for junior high school students and a course for children over nine years of age; the last to be given under the direction of Miss Lillian Stowover, of Wayne University.

All courses start on June 25 and run five days a week through Aug. 18. Courses which are to be offered for school or college credit will continue two weeks longer. The Theatre School will operate outdoors in the Greek Theatre on Cranbrook estate.
