High Twelve Club Has Evening Of Fun At Halloween Party

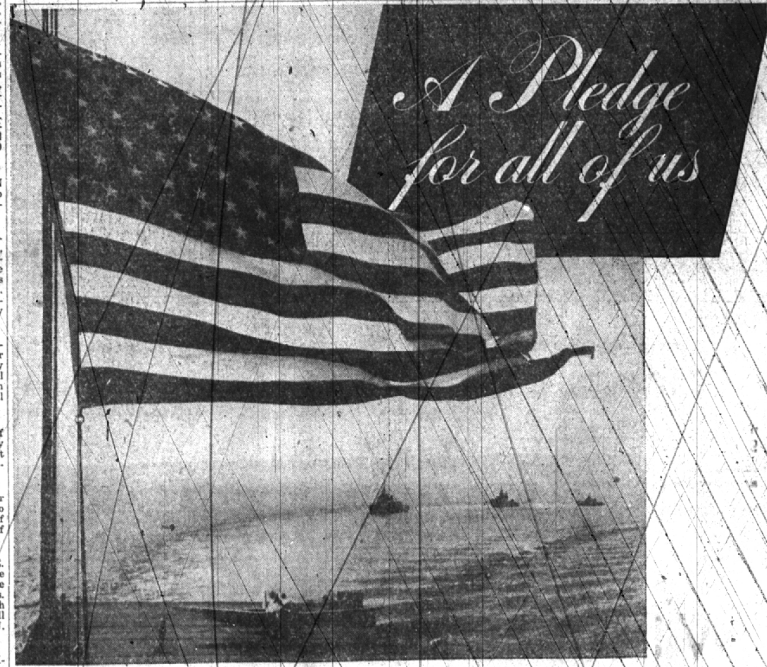
