

New Planes For PCA May Fly On Detroit Route

A \$7,000,000 fleet of the most modern of the postwar airplanes—Martin 202—was purchased Monday by PCA (Pennsylvania Central Airlines), the first of the nation's airlines to acquire this newly developed luxury plane which will fly 100 miles an hour faster than today's sky transports. Some of these new planes may soon be used on the Detroit route.

These new 6-mile-a-minute planes will augment the airline's recently acquired fleet of four-engine DC-4s, it was announced by PCA President C. Bevell Monroe, who today signed for an initial order of 35 of the twin-engine 202 models from the Glenn L. Martin Company, Baltimore, Del. Some of the new planes, which will seat 40 passengers each, will be added to the fleet in 1947, it was stated.

Mr. Monroe described the Martin 202 as a custom built plane designed to meet the Air Transport Association's A-1 specifications and adapted to PCA's specific needs. He termed it an aircraft which would curtail ground time, reduce operating and maintenance costs, offer new comforts and safety, and ultimately pave the way for fares even lower than those now offered in air traveling public. He also stated that the Martin 202 would assure every city having adequate airport facilities and traffic potentialities the full benefits of high-speed, luxury air-line service.

Operating most economically over distances of from 50 to 700 miles, PCA's new planes will serve as flexible transports, teaming with the larger four-engine DC-4s which the company soon will have in operation.

The Martin Company, from which PCA is purchasing the new fleet, is now converting PCA's 12 existing to 36-passenger airplanes. The first of these large planes, prototypes of the round-the-world "Zivko" type, is expected to be flown over segments of the PCA system next month, with the full fleet expected in operation early in 1947.
