**Baldwin Reserves Defeat Dearborn By Score of 17-7**

Displaying a powerful running attack, the Birmingham reserves tallied twice in the fourth quarter to whip Dearborn's reserves 17-7 Thursday afternoon at Pierce Field.

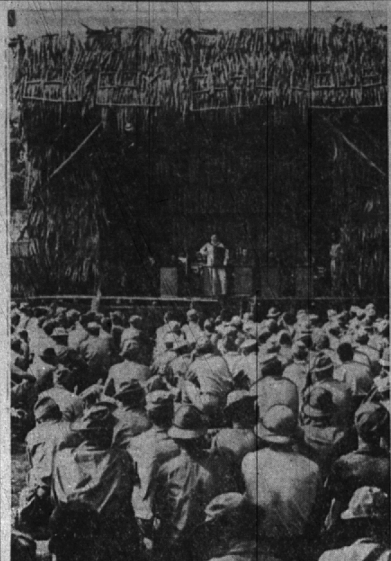
Despite the Maples' domination of play, they led by only two points at the end of the third period. The locals had driven to the Dearborn five-yard stripe in the opening stanza before losing the ball on downs.

On the next play Bruce Smiley tackled Dearborn's halfback, Doug Scott, behind his goal line for a safety and two points. After musting several scoring opportunities in the next two quarters, Birmingham exploded behind the running of George Burdick and Smiley for two touchdowns in the fourth quarter.

The scoring started when Jack Zinsar climaxed a 70-yard drive with an eight-yard sprint around right end for a touchdown. Smiley failed to convert, making it 9-0.

Dearborn threw a scare into the Maples on the following kick-off when Scott ran 90 yards for the visitors' only score. Dave Sebring converted from placement, cutting the locals' lead, 9-7.

Birmingham put the game on ice when Smiley crashed over from the four after a 50-yard march and gave them a 15-7 triumph.

**Armistice Day Is Observed Friday With Fine Program**

Highlighted by the talk of Lt. Don Anderson, a wounded veteran, an assembly commemorated Armistice Day last Friday morning at Baldwin High School.

To open the program Victor Peck of the Methodist Church choir, accompanied by Mrs. Ruth Martin, sang "There Is No Death." Knight Houshion, chairman of the assembly, introduced Lieutenant Anderson, who was prompted to come to Birmingham, he said, by the Christmas boxes and letters sent to him by Baldwin students. He told his interesting impressions of the preparations for D-Day and the fighting in which he participated in France.

His company was one of the first to land in France that day. Lieutenant Anderson was wounded twice, the second time being serious enough to send him back to England and eventually "strapped" to Perry Jones Hospital in Battle Creek.

Following Lieutenant Anderson's talk, Knight Houshion read the Gold Star Honor Roll of 28 Baldwin alumni killed in the service, and three still listed as missing in action.

A minute of silence was observed, after which Gwyn Chapman sang "Tape," the call being echoed twice by bugles, played by Hank Price and Harris Jackson.

**Grand Haven Wins By 13-0 Score**

Last Friday Birmingham traveled across the state to Grand Haven for its seventh encounter of the season. The game was played on the five-week-old Green Hill Field, new football playing ground with Grand Haven winning, 13 to 0.

The game was a close one through the first quarter. But in the second stanza after a 63-yard march LaVerne Boeve went over from the three-yard line on a reverse for six points. The conversion was not successful.

With about one and a half minutes of the game remaining, Thurston connected with a pass to Davey for a gain of 17 yards. Filkins then dropped back and threw a seven-yard pass to Thurston, who advanced with the pass about eight yards. Boeve then reached over Thurston's shoulders and held the ball jointly with Thurston, running along with him a few yards toward the sidelines. Boeve then wrenched the ball from Thurston's arms and ran for a touchdown.

Birmingham gained 118 yards rushing to Grand Haven's 98 and made nine first downs to eight for the Lakesiders. However, the opponents' punts averaged 37 yards to 30 for the Maples.
