of the 29th Infantry Division as a replacement, he served at St. Gervais, Brest, and on the Siegfried Line.

His wife, the former Elizabeth Mae Allen, resides in Birmingham, Mich. He is now assigned to duty with the Ordnance Detachment at Camp Shanks.
