Women Are Urged To Become Better Informed Citizens

"I don't see how the housewife who only stays home to take care of her husband and children can be anything but obsolete. We of the League of Women Voters must lead her to realize that she is not only a mother and a wife but a citizen and that the two cannot be separated."

Need Broader Study "Since the dropping of the first atomic bomb," said Mrs. Hawkins, "the situation has demanded that we be more mature people. We shall have to think as much about UNRRA as about nylon hose. We shall have to think about other people. We are faced with the alternatives of a world government or world destruction."

"We all feel insecure. We are 19th century people living in the 20th century. We must study the question of whether we can have security and freedom at the same time, speaking especially of a world government. I believe we can. I think it can be simply illustrated by the woman who has the freedom to go downtown but to have the security of getting there safely, she must adhere to the discipline of stop lights."

"When Darwin said the 'survival of the fittest' was taken to mean 'the strongest will survive.' Now we feel sure he meant the species that can adapt itself to new environmental conditions will survive. We too must obey that law or be lost," concluded Mrs. Hawkins.

Mrs. Kull pointed out that a thorough study of and fact-finding about the most glaring needs for the need for streamlining county government structure in Michigan is needed, and said: "My purpose is to dimmy you with this dire picture into some kind of activity. Interest yourself in what happens to your tax dollar. Be concerned with your 223 units of government. Be Oakland county second in the state in number of government units; with the fact that there is no single person responsible in county government if things go wrong. Be interested in the problem of having hundreds of officials whom you don't know."

An ideal county government structure discussed by Mrs. Kull would be one with centralized authority vested in one responsible administrator and a board of five in control of policy making who would appoint a county manager to head all county departments.

"Progressive governments," explained Mrs. Kull, "have grown from the first board of supervisors in 1600 with services added hodge-podge until now it is a huge, unwieldy, complex structure which is highly expensive, with many overlapping departments. There is such a multitude of officials that we know nothing about their responsibilities or qualifications."

She cited Los Angeles county as a shining example of a streamlined county structure which saved its population many millions of dollars.
